

Drug Program Moves Offices On Main Street

Hunterdon Drug Awareness Program moved Friday, but remains on Main Street in Flemington.

The drug abuse prevention and counselling group was at 168 Main Street, but now has is in the office building at 8 Main Street, in quarters formerly rented by the Case and Barlow accounting firm.

The 168 Main location is owned by the Flemington Baptist Church, which is next door and announced several months ago that it needed the building for church purposes.

Adrienne A. Peck, executive director of Hunterdon Drug Awareness, said a number of organizations helped with the move.

The move itself was done at no charge by AAA Relocation and Warehousing Specialists of Lebanon, a North American Van Lines agent owned by Martin Hynes.

Flemington Elks donated \$1,000 toward carpeting, which was provided at reduced price by Flemington Department Store.

Donald Ennis, president of Town & Country Bank, and Alexander Roulston, an executive with Ortho Pharmaceutical, arranged donations of used office furniture from their businesses. Both are Hunterdon Drug Awareness board members.

And Mayor Herman Kapp of Flemington arranged for his employer, AT&T, to donate surplus furniture, Mrs. Peck noted.

Hunterdon Drug Awareness is a non-profit, tax-exempt organization supported by the United Way, donations from government units and civic organizations and contributions from the persons who use its services.
